



It's a wrap – our first Carbatec CrushGrind competition is finished & the winners can be announced.



## 1st place went to John Chester's salt & pepper grinders

Timbers used by John were largely cutting board project offcuts & include Rewarewa, Walnut, Tawa, Black Maire, Purpleheart, Maple, Jarrah, Tasmanian Oak & Totara. The salt grinder has a European Beech top, and the pepper has a Merbau top.

Constructed with glue, clamps a jointer, thicknesser and bandsaw then drilled with Forstner bits - there was NO lathe work involved.

Grinders are sealed with Cabot's Benchtop Clear satin to ensure durability, heat & stain resistance to keep them looking great during daily use.

A whimsical, natural wood Christmas Pepper grinder with Attitude!

The body, moveable arms & hat are made of Banksia, eyes are Ebony, nose is Maple, handsome bow tie is Magnolia while the buttons & arm pins are American Oak.

Inspired by a NorthShore Woodturners Club event making Christmas Decorations & Gifts.

Merit - Worthy of Mention - Richard Jackson's shaftless peppermill and Keith Hake's Chilli Grinder.

Richard's pepper grinder is made of Rimu with black cord & akeake buttons.

Peppercorns are set in resin on the top and the carved rings are finished with green metallic paint.



Keith's chilli grinder is made of Totara dug up from the man-made Pegasus lakes in Christchurch.

Green resin was vacuumed into the voids to represent pounamu.

The top is made of ultra clear resin with imitation chillis, and leaves and the entire grinder has multiple coats of resin to finish.


## People's Choice Winner is:
